

Law Letter of Recommendation

It is my great pleasure to recommend XXX for the J.D. program at Columbia Law School. I was XXX professor in a class at Columbia Law School. I was impressed by Ethan's academic performance and his potential for a great lawyer. I believe he would be a unique addition to our J.D. student body and our university community.

I am the former Chairman of Milbank, Tweed, Hadley & McCloy. I received my J.D. and M.B.A. degrees from Columbia University. I am a member of the Columbia Law School Dean's Council and the Columbia Law School Board of Visitors. Since 2013, I have served as an adjunct professor at Columbia Law School, where I teach a seminar named "The Law Firm of Today."
